From the Pastor

I have been reading and meditating on Dietrich Bonhoeffer's writing. Bonhoeffer ranks high on any list of Christian leaders in the 20th century. A German Lutheran preacher, he was personally committed to Christ so strongly that it eventually led him to death at the hands of the Nazis. Here is an excerpt from his writing, *No Greater Love: Lenten Meditations:*

Our Faith Helps us Accept Earthly Life for What It Is

The last enemy to be destroyed is death.

1 Corinthians 15:26

Where one recognizes that the power of death has been broken, where the miracle of the resurrection and of new life shines within the world of death, there one does not demand eternities from life; one accepts from life what it is able to give, not everything or nothing, but good things and bad things, the important and the unimportant, joy and pain. There one does not cling desperately to life, but neither does one throw it away thoughtlessly. There one is satisfied with the time allotted, and does not ascribe eternity to earthly things. One allows death to exercise the limited rights it does, after all, yet have. One expects the new human being and the new world, however, only from what is beyond death, from the power that has overcome death.

Thank you, risen Lord, for the gift of eternal life which I enjoy in part now but which I will enjoy to the full hereafter.

Christ indeed rose again from the dead, and he is our risen Lord.

Fiji News

Pastor Saimone Kete came back from Fiji with some good news. The Fiji Government is helping the Church there with monetary grants. The multiracial congregation at Nadi Airport, which our Senior Pastor Mahesh Giri and his wife Lalita Giri visited last year, is building a modern church

with its share of the grants. In response to help from the government, the Christian churches in Fiji accepted the appointment of clergies in the Senate. A similar system is present in England, where there are clergies appointed to the house of Lords. Hopefully this will increase morality and racial harmony.

Also, the Trinity Broadcast Network (TBN) finally established a channel through Fiji Television in February, and it has become a daily religious broadcast in Fiji, apart from normal Sunday church broadcast service.

Camp Indianola

As you heard last Sunday, Camp Indianola is for sale.

This campsite is owned by Seattle First United Methodist Church, which must sell it to raise money for renovation. The church was severely damaged in last year's earthquake.

The property at Indianola is worth \$2.2 million. All the churches in the conference have been asked to contribute to help purchase this property. A speaker from the conference office will be coming soon to let us know more about it, and we will be sharing more information during worship in the next few months.

Church of Mary Magdalene

It was a beautiful, bright day on Saturday, March 2 for our first dinner of the year for the women of the Church of Mary Magdalene. We served about 30 women a home cooked meal of soy and garlic baked chicken, rice pilaf, tossed vegetable salad, green beans, bread and butter, orange wedges and fruit punch/milk. We decorated

the tables with ribbon and lace fans, faux pearls and nut and candy cups. Thanks to Janelle, Anita, Donna, Blanche, and Barbara for preparing and serving the meal, and to Nellie Ann and Anna for providing fresh ingredients. As always, I felt like I took away more than I gave after working, worshipping and dining with the women of both churches. We are so blessed as a community of faith!
