REPORT FROM OUR FIJI DELEGATION

Leaving on Sunday, August 16, our eight members who went to Fiji have returned, the last group arriving Sunday evening, September 6.

Members of the delegation were Emele Bola, Raijieli Nabenu, Tevita Seru, Sekope Korolevu, Wasa M. Korolevu, Mele Kete, and Marika Motokana.

We're told that because of the very unsettled conditions in Fiji, there was considerable confusion and constant change of plans and arrangements. However, because of the patience and flexibility of all concerned, the trip was worthwhile.

Conditions in Fiji are very difficult, economically, and for the Methodist Church, because of the hostility of the military government towards the Methodist leaders who have spoken against martial law and for democratically conducted elections.

Members of our delegation reported their admiration for our leaders there in their steadfast commitment to democracy, to freedom of religion, but also in their determination to find peaceful solutions.

Expressions of love and support for the people of Fiji have come from many Christian groups around the world. Following is a line from the statement of the World Council of Churches: "WCC is calling upon member churches to pray for the nation and people of Fiji, that a peaceful return to democracy and the rule of law, and a vibrant and peaceful multiracial and multi-faith community, will emerge as soon as possible."



THE REV. AND MRS. ASHOK SINGH

It was a blessing to have The Rev. Ashok Singh as our guest preacher on Sunday, August 30. Rev. Singh gave us a powerful message about his own interesting faith journey, and his remarkable ministry in India.

For 18 years he led a Christian radio ministry that reached hundreds of thousands of homes. He currently holds meetings with intellectuals of a Hindu background who are interested in going more deeply into the scriptures of a number of major religions, including Christianity.

He is very hopeful about the future of this work.


